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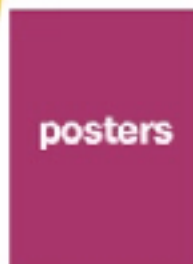
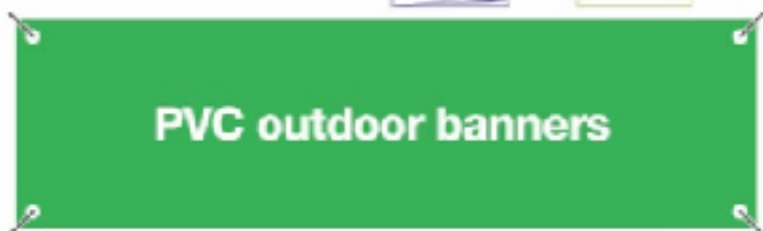


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Canon Mary writes

I have been spending some of my spare time recently sorting out photographs that for a number of years have been sitting in boxes. It has been great to revisit photographs of holidays that Bob and I have enjoyed in the past. In doing so I came across a photograph I took of the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel in Rome. In 2010 I took some people from our group of churches to see the Passion Play in Oberammergau. The visit was part of a longer holiday on which we visited a number of places en-route - places like Pizza, Assisi, Florence and Rome. We had a wonderful time. The Passion Play was an incredible experience and was the highlight of the holiday. But one of the other highlights was having the opportunity to see the wonderful painting by Michelangelo Buonarroti of God and Adam, painted on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel.

Looking carefully at the painting you can't help but notice that God extends his finger to Adam with great vigour, twisting his body so that he can move it as close as possible to Adam. His head is turned towards Adam and his gaze is fixed on him. God's arm is stretched out, with every muscle taut and his index

finger is extended straight forward, towards Adam's.

Traditionally, the title of the painting is 'The Creation of Adam' but some scholars say that it should be called 'The Endowment of Adam'. Adam is already alive - his eyes are open. What is being offered here is life with God.

Adam, on the other hand, has his arm only partially extended towards God, his elbow resting on his knee and his body relaxed. Apparently, one of the messages Michelangelo wanted to convey through this painting was God's determination to reach out to Adam, then having come close he allows just a little space so that Adam can choose. All Adam has to do is lift his finger.

I am very blessed that most of my children and their families live reasonable close to me and even our eldest daughter who lives in South Wales, can be with us in around three hours of motorway driving, but our youngest son lives with his wife and children right up in the north of Scotland. We try to visit as often as we are able and although between visits we can phone or face-time one another, it is not the same as being with them.

By the time you receive this magazine we will just have celebrated the Ascension of Jesus into heaven to be with his Father, remembering that just before he left this earth he promised his followers that he would be with them 'even to the end of the age'.

God loves us with the love of a perfect Father and he wants to be with us and have us be with him, but he allows that little gap which means we get to choose. Sometimes life is so hectic that we forget that God is there. We speak to him when we are in desperate need and want his help, but then for many people, for the rest of the time he becomes just an after-thought or for some, not even thought of at all. We forget to close that gap between the fingers, or even decide not to bother at all.

Our lives move so fast these days that we need to remember to slow down sometimes and let our souls catch up with our bodies - not literally but figuratively. God gave us the sabbath day for rest and if we want to live healthy lives mentally, physically and spiritually, we ignore that rest day at our peril. According to tradition, when the apostle John

was bishop in Ephesus, his hobby was raising pigeons.

On one occasion an Ephesian elder passed his house as he returned from hunting. When he saw John playing with one of his birds, he gently criticised the old apostle for spending time so frivolously. John looked at his critic's hunting bow and remarked that the string was loosened. "Yes," said the huntsman, "I always loosen the string of my bow when it's not in use. If it always stayed tight, it would lose its rebounding quality and fail me in the hunt."

"And I," said John, "am now relaxing the bow of my mind, so that I may better be able to shoot the arrows of divine truth."

We all need times of relaxation and rest. So take time out from the busyness of life to be with God and remember, whether you are aware of it or not, God is always there - waiting - finger outstretched. That meeting with God can happen anywhere, at anytime, for anyone. Whatever your age, season of life, temperament or job - there are no obstacles at all. All you have to do is lift a finger. God is closer than you think!

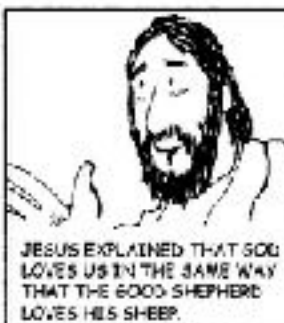

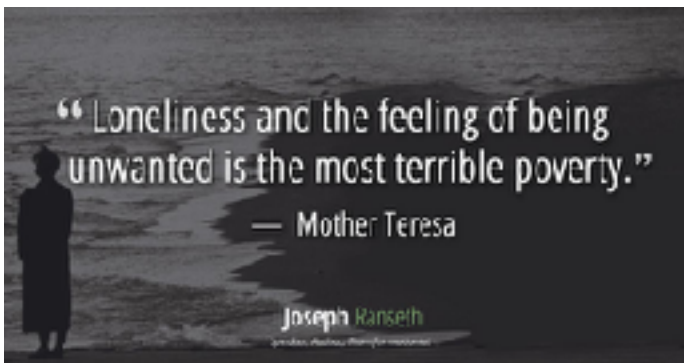
Loneliness week – 17th to 21st June

So, no wonder that last year the Government appointed the world's first loneliness minister, Tracey Crouch. And no wonder that the Marmalade Trust aims to raise

In the month of June

40 years ago, on 7th June 1979 that the first elections for the European Parliament were held.

by standing in front of them on the morning after the massacre.

20 years ago, on 11th June 1999 that the Kosovo War ended when the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia and NATO signed a peace treaty.

I forgot to get some fertiliser

Once again those dratted weeds can help. Make a nettle soup. Pick or pull out nettle weeds you have growing in your borders, or wherever they are growing. Cut into suitable lengths to fill a bucket, pour on a kettle-full of hot water, then top up with cold water and leave to stand for 48 hrs. then strain off the, by now green water, store in used milk containers and to water your hanging baskets and patio pots with a dilution of a cupful in a gallon watering can.

Nettles absorb lots of nutrients and trace elements from the soil, which stay in their leaves all summer and then disperse down to the root system in winter. This is why nettles appear to grow so much more strongly so much earlier than your cosseted plants. So make use of this, the nettle soup will be high in nitrogen, potassium and trace elements which are so important for plant growth.

Summer is now officially here, and prime growth time, so plants like

delphinium, lupin and other tall growing plants will need support if your garden is at all exposed to the prevailing wind, in this area, south/west. It is so annoying to see a tall spike that had so much promise of beauty, lying broken on its side. Three canes and some raffia can save lots of regret.

However, if the worst happens, cut the stem beyond damaged area, put into a tall vase of water, and it will continue to develop for you indoors.

We seem to be in a pattern of wind and gales at the moment.

In the veg garden runner beans usually twine themselves round their stakes, but it pays to check and give them a helping tie if they are growing too quickly to twine themselves properly. The new shoot curls itself by following the sunlight, which is what makes it curl round its stake, but a cloudy day can upset the pattern.
